Wayland Baptist University guard **J.J. Culver** became the fourth player in the history of men's college basketball to score at least 100 points in a single game. The 6-foot-5-inch religion major, a preacher's kid from Lubbock, reached the century mark during a 124-60 win against Southwestern Adventist University. Culver scored 51 points by halftime, breaking Wayland's single-game record of 50 points. Needing 15 more points to reach 1,500 for his career, Head Coach **Ty Harrelson** decided to leave Culver in the game so that he could attempt to reach that milestone. At 84 points, Harrelson realized Culver had a chance to make college basketball history. Harrelson praised Culver's character and work ethic, telling the *Baptist New Mexican* Culver has been "a great leader," both

among his teammates and on campus. "He's been a great ambassador for the university. He consistently has been the hardest worker in our skill sessions and in the weight room and conditioning—whatever it might be. He goes the extra mile," Harrelson said.

East Texas Baptist University received word Dec. 10 from its regional accrediting body—the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges—that ETBU was in compliance with all 75 standards and 25 policies to reaffirm accreditation with no recommendations. Accreditation signifies the institution has a mission appropriate to higher education; has resources, programs, and services sufficient to accomplish and sustain that mission; and maintains clearly specified educational objectives consistent with its mission and appropriate to the degrees it offers, and that indicate whether it is successful in achieving its stated objectives. The next reaffirmation period is set to begin in 10 years.

The University of Mary Hardin-Baylor awarded the Provost Medal for highest grade-point average to 10 students who graduated Dec. 13 with a perfect 4.0 GPA. Jacob Alexander Chesser of Boerne, who also received the President's Award for meritorious service, was one of the Provost Medal recipients.
